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The National Qualification Framework

The National Qualification Framework was developed as a way of arranging qualifications into levels so that equivalents can be more easily understood. They start at entry level and go up to level 4. The higher the level, the greater the depth of knowledge, skills and understanding that the student has to show to gain the qualification.

Glossary of qualifications

Applied A levels

From September 2005, the vocational A level will be replaced by the applied A level. This is a new name for what was called the Vocational Certificate of Education (VCE). The course has some features of the VCE but has adopted the AS/A2 structure of the GCEs. They have been designed to give students a broad introduction to a vocational area and help them to develop and apply knowledge in a variety of work-related situations.

BTEC Entry level Certificates in Skills for Working Life introduces learners to the skills they need to work in a career area they are interested in.

BTEC First Certificates and Diplomas are NQF level 2 vocational qualifications and provide the initial knowledge and understanding for students who want to work or to take further study at level 3.

BTEC National Diplomas, Certificates and Awards are at NQF level 3 and focus on a specialist occupational area.

NVQs are designed by industry for industry. They assess the skills that candidates show at work and are available at five levels, from level 1 for routine jobs to level 5 for jobs with complicated tasks and major responsibility.

Vocational GCSE

Students can study vocational programmes from the age of 14. These courses can offer progression routes through vocational A levels and other level 3 qualifications to degree courses. Examples of subjects offered include business, art, information communication technology (ICT) and manufacturing.
